Summer Ring at Gresford June 2016



The *All Saints Gresford Handbell Ringers* hosted a delightful rally, different from any others I have attended.

Once registered and refreshed we split into our three groups.

The first visited the 14th century church *All Saints*, complete with misericords and rood screen. The screen which separates the nave from the chancel is fifteenth century, probably from the Ludlow workshop. The wainscoting, and the fan vaulting which is further ornamented by liernes, make it one of the finest screens in Wales. There are many notable memorials along the walls and on the floor of the church. The Trevor Chapel houses a wall painting commemorating the Gresford Colliery disaster of 22 September 1934, when 266 men died. Mentioned in the Doomsday book *All Saints* is often called "The best Cheshire Church in Wales".

There are impressive yew trees in the church yard, most of them planted in 1726, but an enormous one older than 1600 years.

The second group joined the tower bell ringers in the belfry and rang a few changes. This is the only church in Britain to have two completely independent sets of bells (a ring of 8, a lighter ring of 6, and also 1 tolling bell). The older 8-set is one of the *Seven Wonders of Wales*. The suspicious red stains on the tower roof floor were – yes- blood! Caused by red kites eating their prey.

The third group were entertained by Dr. Elfed-Owens who told us about Welsh culture, history, customs, and costumes. We heard about the famous *Big Ben* and his formidable wife, who although English by birth were Welsh to the core. Then we earned our lunch by learning about music and dancing, and then we danced.

The afternoon proved both instructive and entertaining as we learned the background to the better and lesser known Welsh music we played. It was all massed ringing, beginning with a spirited rendition of *Men of Harlech*. Next was the sad hymn *Gresford* written to commemorate the mining disaster of 1934. This was followed by *Watching the Bloomin' Wheat*. Despite being a sorry tale it was a delight to ring. There was another hymn *Rhyd-lydan* and we finished with *Sospan Fach*, worth driving 100 miles for, to find out what it meant!

Then the Welsh tea – lovely! After intense debate and comparative trials it was decided Welsh cakes were preferred without butter – but the debate continues.

2016 has also seen the 17th International Handbell Symposium hosted by Canada and held in Vancouver. Nearly 90 members of HRGB attended this event and there are recordings available on YouTube and on Facebook of some of the performances. HRGB was represented in the International Concert by East Anglian Regional Team. I highly recommend that if you have a Facebook account, you 'like' HRGB as this will enable you to see what is going on around the country.

Several teams from all over the UK also submitted recordings of themselves playing 'The Toreador's Song as part of the BBC Get Playing scheme. This involved downloading the appropriate version of the music, performing it to the speed set by the virtual conductor, uploading the recording and then waiting to see if it would be featured! In total there were 6 teams whose pictures were shown although more teams had their music included in the final performance, released on iPlayer on the day of The Last Night of the Proms.

Now we are in the run up to Christmas, so I'm sure many of you are busy planning your ringing schedule. We are also on the countdown to the Golden Jubilee of HRGB. This will be celebrated next year through a variety of events, both regionally and nationally. Things to look out for include; music compositions, Exeter National Rally, a regional teddy bear who will be travelling around to team events and of course, the big celebration on 7^{th} October 2017 which will be a 1967 themed rally. More details to follow!

Just before lunch the teams were given an unseen piece, Oh How Lovely Is The Evening. It was based on a "Round" between 3 sections of teams. It was challenging because we had to sing at the same time.



Then it was a lovely break for lunch and a quiz. Well done to Kirkby Lonsdale's great quizzers and thanks to Sheila who set the questions and unwittingly gave us the answer to question 4! We had to disregard that question which brought much laughter.

North-West Region Rally Report

On the 22nd October, the second NW region Mini-rally took place in Dean, which is about as far as it is possible to get from London, and still be in England. Of course, Dean does have other good points. Once you have navigated your way to the far west along Route A66 it is not Californian hospitality that awaits you, but the much superior West Cumberland variety, starting with a very welcome mug of tea. We checked that all the team had got there, got set up, and started meeting old friends. Sorry, that is 'Friends of long-standing', although one or two are fairly mature.

Then we unloaded The Hats. Not just 'the hats', but 'THE HATS'. In celebration of Her Maj's recently becoming the longest serving monarch, etc., Dean had invited us to create suitable red, white and blue decorated headgear, to be paraded in front of the admiring assembly.

The rally started, not with the usual massed ringing, but with Greystoke's individual selection. This was not wilful disregard of procedure, but because an important person (the conductor, I believe) had to leave for an Even More Pressing Engagement. Before she left, Greystoke treated us to Trumpet Voluntary and Birthday Rag. This was notable for the disparity in the music. A fairly large gentleman of the bass persuasion seemed to be ringing from a postcard, while a modest sized lady at the top end completely disappeared behind a huge spread of paper.

Then we started the rally 'properly', with a massed ring of the Toreador tune. After a lot of hard practice and much muttering, Kirkby Lonsdale can just about struggle through this. S l o w l y. It went a teeny bit faster than we were comfortable with, but we sort of got through it. Dean, as hosts, kicked off the individual section with Horsey-horsey. Apparently the Queen is fond of them. Kirkby Lonsdale got in the party spirit with Sing Hosanna, and Tantony (nice to see you!) rang Blessed Assurance. This is one of our favourite pieces and we had considered it, so we were very glad we picked something else. Kinder, sorry Three of a Kind (who have absolutely no connection at all with that famous team, oh dear me, no), gave us a four in hand masterclass of popular country tunes. Marron Valley (it is nice to see how these rather isolated teams share ringers) finished the first individual section with Matchstalk Men. The first half finished with the massed ringing of Le Lierre (The Ivy). I don't recall ever playing Gounod before; we were a bit doubtful at first, but it grows on you.

After lunch, during which some members of Kirkby Lonsdale displayed an amazing knowledge of Royal trivia for the Quiz, and the raffle (I noticed the shouts of 'Fix' got a lot quieter when Greystoke people started winning a 'few' prizes!); we restarted gently with the ring from scratch. Not a challenging ring, but a bit different when rung and sung as a round. Massed Ringing again, and Land of Hope and Glory caused a few chests to swell with pride. Or perhaps it was stomachs. Whatever.

Marron Valley began the second half with a Scottish feel, Dundee Bonnets and Charlie is ma Darlin`. Three odd people totally unconnected with Kinder rang Marietta's Catherine Wheel, which we haven`t heard for a while, and Can-Can; during which we were treated to a `Show` by a certain smallish person from Greystoke. She doesn`t just ride a scooter, she dances as well! Restoring us to something resembling sanity, Tantony displayed the Fanfare from Pictures at an Exhibition, and Greystoke, with Chris now the right way up, rang Pachelbel`s Canon and the Jupiter theme from The Planets. Kirkby Lonsdale continued the party theme with Party Popper, and Dean concluded the Individual section with Maori Magic. Before the final Massed Ring we had a parade of THE HATS! These ranged from tasteful, impeccably assembled triumphs of the Milliners` Art, to, well, mine. But it was all jolly good fun, and no animals were harmed during the process, although some might have been rather startled. The day finished with the Massed Ringing of all three pieces and the tea for which Dean is justly renowned.

As usual, a big Thankyou to Dean for another well-organised and very enjoyable rally; and a reminder (I am sure you will read this elsewhere) that the theme for our autumn meeting next year (the 50th Anniversary meeting) is `1967`. See you there!
